Why Live The Corporal & Spiritual Works Of Mercy?

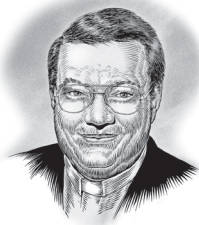
Know This...

The Catechism says that 'works of mercy' are "charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbors in their bodily and spiritual needs." God gives us the grace to perform human acts of charity. We either respond positively to it or reject it. In the parable of the sheep and goats in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus ties our salvation to our love for God and neighbor: Those who care for others will enter heaven; while those who do not will enter hell. If we live the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy, we do God's will and experience joy in this life.



John: The Corporal Works of Mercy are directed to the body. They call us to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, visit the sick and those in prison, and bury the dead.

James: The Spiritual Works of Mercy are directed to the soul. They call us to warn sinners, instruct the ignorant, counsel the doubtful, comfort the sorrowful, patiently bear wrongs, and pray for the living and the dead.



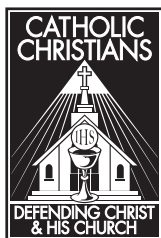
John: When we live the Works of Mercy, we come to the aid of our neighbors; but more importantly we serve God, experience joy, and grow in holiness.

James: If we love Jesus, we will imitate His compassion for those in need, detach ourselves from possessions that distract us, and see our enemies as neighbors.

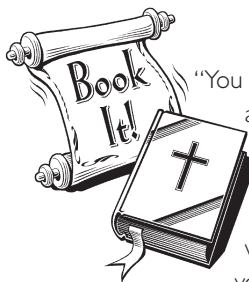
