## Does Each Sacrament Cleanse Us Of All Sin?

*Know This...*

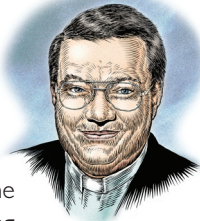
We have a common enemy that determines whether we spend eternity in heaven or in hell. Yes, Satan is a common enemy; but he does not determine our final destiny. Sin does! It's the only enemy we must fear and confront with all the weapons God gives us. The seven sacraments faithfully received and properly used can, to varying degrees, destroy sin and the stain it leaves on our souls. We must understand and acknowledge that not every sacrament is capable of cleansing the human soul of all sins.



**John:** There is original sin and actual sin. The two degrees of actual sin are venial and mortal. Mortal sin is called "deadly" sin because it destroys all grace in the soul.

**James:** There are two aspects of actual sin: guilt and punishment. When God forgives the guilt of sin, the punishment associated with it remains until penance is done.

**John:** Only the **Sacrament of Baptism** can cleanse the soul of original sin. Baptism also removes the guilt and punishment of all sin.



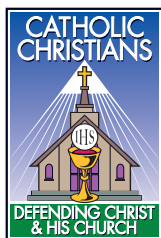
**James:** **Reconciliation** can cleanse the soul of mortal and venial sin. **Anointing of the Sick** can cleanse the soul of mortal sin if true sorrow is present and Confession is not possible.

**John:** We don't have to confess our venial sins; but confessing them is meritorious. They are cleansed by fervent prayer, the sacraments, and works of charity.

**James:** If we receive **Confirmation, Eucharist, Holy Orders, or Matrimony** in a state of mortal sin, we commit another mortal sin — sacrilege.

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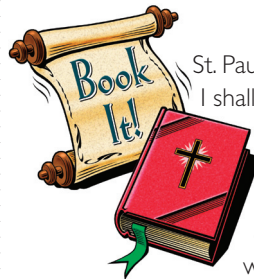


Before our Lord ascended into heaven, He told the Apostles, "Go...make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father; and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." Mt. 28:19-20 It is through the grace we receive in the sacraments that Christ is most tangibly with us. "I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you." Jn. 14:18 And so our Lord does—in the sacraments.

"Jesus' words and actions during his hidden life and public ministry were already salvific, for they anticipated the power of his Paschal mystery. They announced and prepared what he was going to give the Church when all was accomplished. The mysteries of Christ's life are the foundations of what he would henceforth dispense in the sacraments, through the ministers of his Church, for [as St. Leo the Great wrote] 'what was visible in our Savior has passed over into his mysteries.'" CCC 1115 "The visible rites by which the sacraments are celebrated signify and make present the graces proper to each sacrament. They bear fruit in those who receive them with the required dispositions." CCC 1131 "Grace alone conquers sin." St. Augustine
